Batteries. While you can put "household" alkaline batteries in the trash, it is DANGEROUS and ILLEGAL to dispose of all rechargeable and most single-use batteries with trash or recycling. Batteries can catch fire and even explode. Improper disposal can lead to serious property damage, injury, and even death.

Before recycling your used batteries, it's important to prepare them correctly to avoid any risks, such as short-circuiting or accidental fires. Here's how: Use plastic bags or tape. To prevent short-circuiting, which can occur if the terminals of different batteries touch, place each battery in a separate plastic bag. Alternatively, cover ...

A sealed battery is safe to handle, but improperly disposing of a battery is dangerous. Don't simply throw your battery in your household garbage or use your typical recycling method. These hazardous materials need to be disposed of carefully, and, in most cases, you'll be paid for getting rid of it.
